Planned use of PE Premium at Stephen Freeman 2019/20

Funding is provided to ensure schools achieve self-sustaining improvement in the quality of PE and sport in Primary Schools, securing improvement in the following areas:

1. The engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity, kick starting healthy active lifestyles.
2. The profile of PE and sport being raised across the school as a tool for whole-school improvement.
3. Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport.
4. Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to pupils.
5. Increased participation in competitive sport.

In April 2019, the school will receive approximately £16,000 of funding and spent it in the following ways:

Provision		
Coaching company (Get Active) employed to work with children from Year 1 to Year 6 to provide active lunchtime provision £3000	Lunchtimes have continued to be active with a large number of children being engaged in healthy activities and active sessions. Lunchtime behavior has improved. Children have seen sport as fun and exciting. Some children wait for the sessions to begin and are disappointed on days when it does not happen.	This will not be continued next year. Lunchtime controllers will work in 'bubbles' at the beginning of the year. This will mean that active lunchtimes will not work in the same way.
Increase range of sports on offer by purchasing equipment to support teachers in planning and organising fun and different sporting opportunities. This will include sound and vision equipment for assessment of PE and indoor PE sessions £2000	Equipment purchased this year have enabled children to participate in new sports such as dodge ball, ultimate frizzbee. Children have also benefited from having good equipment for athletics and netball and football.	Continue to purchase equipment to help the teaching of other, different sports including golf and flag football. Investigate computing equipment to support the teaching – photo-taking equipment and music facilities in the hall for dance.

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Provide funding to purchase a school mini bus to enable children participating in sport to attend tournaments, fixtures and opportunities: £2500	Due to Covid19 this did not take place	Money is still available for this to happen during the next academic year.
Organise and maintain the PE equipment to protect it and enable it to last longer and to make it easy for staff to use it. To do this a new PE storage shed will be purchased and built to house the ever growing stock. £3500	Gym equipment was repaired which enables all classes to use the hall for gymnastics and other PE activities with ease and safety. Storage shed was not purchased as we were unable to have visitors on site due to covid regulations	Storage shed to be purchased during the next academic year to help organise and store the ever growing PE equipment. This will support staff to deliver and teach a range of sport with ease and expertise.
Training		
Provide further training for MDA to give them the skills and ideas of how to engage and provided active lunchtimes. This training will be run alongside Get Active: £500	MDA were given the opportunity to observe active lunchtimes where the children were engaged in activities that developed their skills and participations levels during the lunchbreak. Unfortunately this process was not complete due to lockdown.	Further training to take place in the next academic year. With 'bubbles' there has not been the significant need for this to take place.
Have funding available for adults to attend CPD training courses. To improve the provision for children in the school: £1000	Staff attended the PE conference and attended further CPD opportunities. This included swimming teacher training, flag football, speed stack UK, cricket and golf.	These coursed will enable the school to teach new sports such as Flag Football and speed stack. This will also support the school in delivering swimming for children from year 4 – 6. In the future this will help with the percentage of children able to swim when they leave year 6.

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<p>Links</p> <p>Create links with local sports clubs to give children the opportunities to take part in sport outside of school £500</p>	<p>Links were established with two local football clubs and a number of children in the school now play for both teams.</p> <p>Links were also established with a local cricket club and there were plans to obtain some additional coaching and run a tournament in conjunction with the club but due to covid restrictions this was unable to take place.</p>	<p>Further work will take place next year to create links with local sports clubs.</p> <p>Possible links will include – Harwell Tennis Club, Local Taekwondo club and golf clubs.</p>
<p>Swimming</p> <p>Provide top up swimming teaching for year 5 and 6 children to improve the percentage of children who reached the national level. £1000</p>	<p>Due to Covid19 regulations this did not take place this year.</p>	<p>As a school we will look at other options for providing swimming top up for children that will not reach the national expectation.</p>

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Swimming is a core area on the national curriculum. At Stephen Freeman children from year 4 – 6 are provided with swimming lessons during the school year. This year due to Covid19 restrictions only year 4 were able to complete their swimming sessions. Year 5 had half of their allocation but unfortunately year 6 were not able to take part in swimming activities.

At the end of year 6 the school reports that:

What percentage of your Year 6 pupils could swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres when they left your primary school at the end of last academic year?	75% (percentage based on information from the last academic year and information taken from parents)
What percentage of your Year 6 pupils could use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke and breaststroke] when they left your primary school at the end of last academic year?	70% (percentage based on information from the last academic year and information taken from parents)
What percentage of your Year 6 pupils could perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations when they left your primary school at the end of last academic year?	We are unable to give a percentage for this.
Schools can choose to use the Primary PE and Sport Premium to provide additional provision for swimming but this must be for activity over and above the national curriculum requirements. Have you used it in this way?	This was going to take place this year but with covid restrictions we were unable to do this. Will look to do this next year.

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
