Curriculum In Action

March 31st 2023

Rainbow Explorers started the term by learning about Shrove Tuesday (pancake day). Mrs Rowan had a very busy day making pancakes and the children tasted them using a 5's framework to vote for their favourite topping. This was followed by an action packed World Book Day which involved another special snack (cucumber hungry caterpillars), as well as lots of fantastic costumes, story sharing, character hunts and painting character portraits. For the rest of the term we have been reading the story of 'The Ugly Duckling'. The children have been thinking carefully about the feelings of the characters in the story and choosing instruments to represent each character. They have love moving to the instruments that they chose. Of course we took full advantage of the surprise snowy day and the children had a fantastic time playing outside. We have learnt some lovely new songs and signs from Miss Wilde during national singing week.





Reception

The term has been filled with 'did you know' facts about animals. We began the term with enquiry questions and facts about animals and as the term has progressed we have been finding out the answers to our questions.

In maths we have been learning how to double numbers and the children have loved this, they enjoy finding and representing doubles in the continuous provision. PE lessons have been a great success and we have enjoyed the new trainers fashion show. We combined art and IT for our mother's day celebrations. As well as using their art skills the children used an app to record a message and take a selfie. In order to receive their Easter chocolate lolly from the Easter Bunny, the children had to complete a phonics and maths scavenger hunt.

The odd one out is the blue whale because it is a mammal that needs to come to the surface often enough to breath. A blue whale also has live babies called calves which are fed with milk. The other two animals are fish as they have gills and can stay underwater indefinitely.





Year 1 discovered strange colourful marks in the car park, they were amazed and confused by the discovery. When the children returned to their classroom they found video footage of an unfamiliar object floating in the sky above the school building. So many questions were asked; had the school been visited by a UFO, had an alien invasion taken place or were the teachers playing a trick? As the term has progressed, we have learnt more about space and in literacy the children created a newspaper report about the discovery of the strange

marks. The children were inspired to create their own planets by the work of the artist Sarah Cox. She uses multiple layers of paper and string in her papier mache work to create depth and texture to her sculptures. In science the children carried out an investigation to find the best material for an astronaut's nappy! There has been some wonderful home learning with the children creating an array of rockets, space biscuits and planet mnemonics.






This term **Year Two** have travelled back in time to 1666 to learn all about 'The Great Fire of London'. We started our topic with an amazing workshop where the children dressed up and took part in a range of exciting activities. The made candles, writing quills, soap, jewellery and leather bookmarks. The children also had the chance to explore medicines of the time. In our writing lessons, the children imagined themselves as reporters writing about the events surrounding the fire. Our topic informed our learning in history as we found out more about life in 1666. Our art lessons have been really creative as the children have learnt about mixing colours and how colour can inform our emotions. We would like to say a huge thank you to everyone who made and bought cakes for our fundraising cake sale. You helped us raise an incredible £550 which means that our trip to Warwick Castle can go ahead. **Thank you.**



Our topic in **Year 3** has been 'Flow'. We have learnt all about the features of a river and in Science we have bee looking at the uses of water and how it changes. We have loved reading, 'When Jessie came across the sea' by Amy Hest. Inspired by this book we created a mural of ships entering New York harbour. It has been fascinating to learn about the sinking of the Titanic and we have examined existing evidence to draw our own conclusions about what happened. In art we have been learning about how different artists paint water and light and we have been using paints and pastels to get our colours just right. Our maths learning has been centred around fractions and in RE we have been learning about Easter and why the Friday before Easter Sunday is called, 'Good Friday.






We have had a wonderful term in **Year 4** and the highlight was our trip to Oxford Castle. During the visit the children were able to see first hand how the Normans build a fortified castle. They walked up the 101 'Norman Trip Steps' and peaked through the cross bow windows. The children appreciated the view of Oxford from the top of the Motte and could see why this was such a strategic position to build a castle. It was fascinating to learn about the different prisoners who have been imprisoned at the castle and it was interesting to learn that if you were a rich prisoner you could buy a better cell and even enjoy afternoon tea. This term we have been learning about the Battle of Hastings and we had a discussion about whether the odds were stacked against Harold even before the battle started. This has informed our newspaper reports which we have written in our English lessons. In Maths we have focused on multiplying and dividing decimal numbers.






Year 5 have been learning about the tectonic plates of the Earth, their movements and how movement of these plates creates geographical features such as volcanoes, mountains and earthquakes. In science we explored states of matter and how solids, liquids and gases react to each other. The children were tasked with separating materials using a variety of equipment and then recording their observations. To develop our writing skills we have written formal persuasive letters, fact files and reports. It has been exciting to see the children so engaged and linking their learning between subjects. We have taken an exciting tour of the USA through our guided reading book 'Holes', to making pretzels and learning about Rosa Parks. From this work the children produces some incredible palindrome poems that addressed issues around inequality, stereotypes and negative emotions. As

teachers we were proud of how the children discussed these issues and how they were able to articulate their feelings.

gymnastics, tag rugby and a session using the wall


