Reception

What a wonderful last term we have had, the highlights were our sports day and the stay and play. We enjoyed welcoming parents into the classroom and the children loved sharing their school environment with you all. Sports day was a great success and the children were resilient and enthusiastic as they completed their sporting tasks. The PTA surprised us with two wonderful experiences. Farms2Ewe and a circus. Both events were full of awe and wonder. The Reception team have seen such a development in the children's characters and we know they are all ready for Year 1. They are a wonderful group of little humans who have made us laugh and burst with pride.







Year 1

Term six got off to a great start with the Year One trip to Cotswold Wildlife Park. It was a wonderful day out and everyone thoroughly enjoyed seeing the different animals. During the visit the children learned all about penguins and lemurs and they used this information to create their own fact files. In science the children have learnt how to categorise animals e.g. mammals, amphibians and reptiles. Some amazing artwork has been produced this term in the style of Henri Rousseau. We used oil pastels, poster paint and water colour to create some wonderful animal themed art. Year one have also enjoyed using 'Code for Life' which develops early coding skills, practising for sports day and the visit from Farms2Ewe.

Year 2

This term Year two became environmental heroes! At the start of the term we received a letter from an orang -utan called Tango and he told us how his habitat is being destroyed to make way for palm oil plantations. In order to help Tango the children wrote persuasive letters to Cadbury's to ask them to stop using palm oil. The children also created a Year 2 eBook all about the orang-utans and the problems they are facing. They are selling this book to their families and friends to raise money to adopt an orang-utan thorough the World Wildlife Fund. We also learned all about Shelley and Shelby, two sea turtles, who told us all about pollution in the oceans. The children learnt about how plastic harms the sea creatures and created booklets to inform others. As you can see the children created some wonderful pictures of sea turtles using oil pastels. We are so proud of our Year 2 children.










In **Year 3** we have been learning all about forces and magnets. The children went on a trip to Winchester Science Museum where they were able to use the interactive exhibitions to support their classroom learning. We made our own rockets and found out some amazing facts about space in the planetarium. The children have really enjoyed learning all about the weapons that the Romans used. They made their own shields and these were used in a battle on the school field.



Year 4 have had a term packed with fun and learning. Our topic was 'Blue Abyss' and we used oil pastels to create our own artwork inspired by David Doubilet's 'Barracuda' photograph. We researched the work of Sir David Attenborough and the children wrote their own biographies. I maths, we focussed on shape and space and investigated symmetry and reflection. As a year group we really enjoyed our trip to Bristol Aquarium which was fully funded by money raised during enterprise week. The children were amazed by the size of some of the fish and the

beauty of the tropical tank. It was really exciting to see the blue lobster which is exceptionally rare. As a Year 4 team we would like to say an enormous thank you for all your support this year. We hope you have a wonderful summer









In **Year 5** we have been studying crime and punishment throughout History. We were particularly interested in the Tudor era and the children wrote about the gruesome ways that criminals were tried and punished. We had a visit from a curator from the Oxford Museum and she shared artefacts and costumes from the Tudor period. The children were able to try the costumes on and learn to write with a quill. At the end of this newsletter you can see a montage of photographs from the day. We had a visit to the UTC for one final time to test and see forces in action. We also explored how space buggies move over different terrains and how gravity and friction enables movement. As teachers we have been incredibly impressed with how the children have responded to their learning this term and we want to thank you for your support.

What a jam-packed final term it has been for **Year 6**. Our term started with our swimming lessons where the children have grown in confidence and many have completed their 25 metre swim check. Over 40 children took part in the Bikeability sessions and the instructors were impressed at how resilient the children were riding in such hot weather. We enjoyed our recent trip to Reading Museum where we experienced what is was like to be a child at school and at work in Victorian times. The children role played a Victorian school and learnt about the standards of Victorian teachers. They saw the punishments that were used for poor behaviour such as the dunce hat and the cane! They enjoyed learning about the array of jobs that were on offer during Victorian times and they couldn't believe the role of a Chamber Maid.
